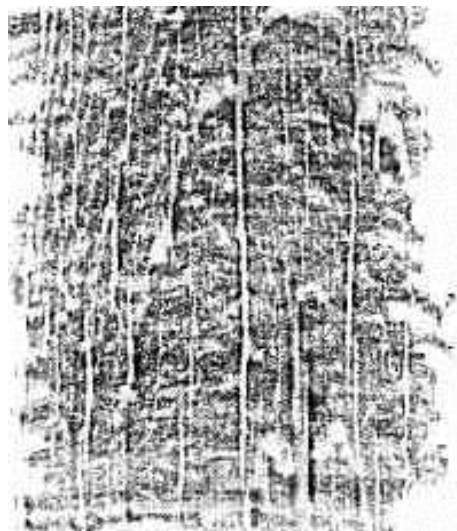


Frottage



<u>Target group</u>	4-6 years old
<u>Material</u>	- Paper - Wasco
<u>Procedure</u>	<p><u>1.Walk through the park</u> First we go to the park/forest and walk around and look around. Then we make a big circle so we can talk and tell what we are going to do.</p> <p><u>2.Focus on the texture of materials</u> You're already in a surrounding with a lot of objects with different textures. You're walking around with the children and make them aware of the different materials in the surrounding. You have to make them feel the different objects and also let them observe them. So the children will wonder that not all of the things are the same. You ask them to think about the texture of a tree or a flower or anything that they have seen and felt during</p>

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	<p>the walk through the park/forest.</p> <p>When they are finished, you explain the next step.</p> <p><u>3.Frottage</u></p> <p>The teacher says to the children what they need to do. Every child gets a paper and a wasco. They can first put the paper on an object and then draw with the wasco on it. So the texture of it will disappear in the paper. The children will discover again that not all of materials have the same print. As a teacher, it is your job to make this clear to them. The drawings will be taken to the class, so they can make something with them.</p> <p><u>3.Frottage</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Tangram: You cut the papers with the frottage into pieces. With these pieces you can make a tangram - Memory: Let the children make twice the same print from one object. In the classroom you can use them to play a memory game. - Domino: Let the children make 2 or more of the same prints from things. In the classroom you make a domino of it.
<p><u>Variations</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - You can do exactly the same thing in the classroom or on the playground - You can discuss the details in all the materials they have found in the park/forest - You can classify the prints - ...
