



<u>Target group</u>	Age : 5-6
<u>Material</u>	Clay Tools to work the clay (knife, wood, rolling pin,) Cameras (manipulated by the teacher): to take pictures of the children's realisations Elements that the children have picked up in the nature (some days earlier)
<u>Procedure</u>	 Theteacher exhibits in the classroom some documents or pictures with prints (E.g. Max Ernst). He explains to the children the characteristics of the prints. Model, experiment with the clay with the hands. Roll the clay for make a plane form. Children try to make a print with their hands and their fingers for discover how to make a print manipulating the clay. Children use the things they have collected in the nature several days before. They make a print with their treasures. After 20 minutes, the teacher stops the activity. He



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	 explains that the clay should dry. The next day, the teacher and all children look at all the productions. The children can explain what they wanted to do. The others can ask questions, and make comments. The teacher takes pictures of all productions. And he puts the pictures in the classroom.
<u>Variations</u>	 Herbarium with the different shapes of leaves / plants , to be able to distinguish them. Pick up on the ground different leaves / plants Knead the clay with the hands Roll the clay to make a plane form Try to make a print with their leaves / plants. They put it on the clay and press with rolling pin. The teacher writes the name of every leaf / plant on the clay. After 20 minutes, the teacher stops the activity. He explains that the clay should dry The next day, the teacher and all children look at all productions. The children see the different forms of leaves and plants, and discover that all of them are different.
<u>Aims</u>	 refine one's tactile perceptions: learn to distinguish different characteristics of different materials learn to look at things from another perspective: choose an unusual point of view learn to observe in details, to compare art: act and create to observe, compare and discover
<u>Comments</u>	With these activities, children can understand that the print can stay for a very long time. Their treasure can be destroyed and can rot, but the print can stay for the other people to look at them.

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
